LaFollette Medical Foundation Distribution Guidelines

The following are the guidelines to be used by the Foundation in creating grant applications and awarding grants of Foundation Funds:

Objectives

To increase the availability of health services in the LaFollette community, which includes all of Campbell County, Tennessee, and in particular to underserved groups such as:

- Frail elderly
- Individuals living in rural or remote areas
- Individuals with or at risk for chronic diseases such as cancer, diabetes, heart disease, asthma and stroke
- Maternal, infant, child and adolescent populations
- Medicaid/TennCare eligible individuals
- Physically and mentally disabled individuals
- Substance abusers
- Uninsured and underinsured individuals
- Individuals with HIV/AIDs
- Victims of family violence

To promote good health and prevent illness:

- Chronic diseases (including early detection and intervention)
- Communicable diseases
- Infant mortality
- Children's safety and well being
- Senior safety and well being
- Nutrition
- Oral health
- Physical activity
- Risk behaviors (such as alcohol, tobacco and other substance abuse)

To support other health programs of merit that are related to the Foundation's mission and objectives

Eligible Organizations

In order to be eligible for a grant from the Foundation, an organization must qualify for exemption under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and must not be a private foundation as defined by Section 509(a) of the Code, or it must be a public instrumentality. Grants may not be made to individuals.

Distribution Guidelines continued

The Foundation may make grants to organizations providing services to Campbell County, TN residents for the following purposes:

- Increase the availability of health services to underserved groups
- Promote good health
- Prevent illness
- Children's well-being
- Senior safety and wellness
- Any health program that has merit and is related to the Foundation's mission and objectives

The Foundation *will not* make grants:

- For capital projects ("bricks and mortar" or land acquisition)
- For general operating support or indirect costs
- To individuals
- For newsletters, magazines or books
- To churches or religious organizations for projects that primarily benefit their own members (exception: Church based programs funded by multiple sources with broad community support or broad community benefit)
- For disease specific organizations seeking support for national research projects or programs
- To sponsor special events, productions, telethons, performances or similar fundraising or advertising activities
- For legislative lobbying, propaganda or other political purposes
